THE ARTS ARE EVERYWHERE

- Mississippi is a land of legendary artists and the birthplace of American music. The arts are present from the rolling hills of the north to the white sand beaches of the south. You can discover new experiences in a historic theater, a small Juke Joint, or a new 21st-century museum. You don't need to go very far to experience a genuine taste of the rich culture thanks to the festivals and performing arts venues.
- When people think of the arts and Mississippi, many often think of the Delta. In the Mississippi Delta National Heritage Area (MDNHA), the story of the blues is told at the **Delta Blues** Museum (Clarksdale). In this region, music is part of daily life and annual gatherings like the **Sunflower River Blues & Gospel Festival** (Clarksdale) or the Mississippi Delta Blues & Heritage Festival (Greenville).
- But Mississippi's arts and cultural richness are sprinkled throughout the state through institutions that amplify the impact of Mississippi artists nationally and internationally. These include the Mississippi Museum of Art (Jackson), the GRAMMY Museum

- Mississippi (Cleveland), the only museum of its kind outside of Los Angeles, and the Mississippi Arts & **Entertainment Experience** (The MAX, Meridian). Additionally, the USA **International Ballet Competition is** held in Mississippi (Jackson).
- Speaking of influential artists, you can find out more about some of them by visiting museums that are devoted to their work, such as the **B.B. King Museum & Delta Interpretive Center** (Indianola), William Faulkner's Home Rowan Oak (Oxford), The Elvis Presley Birthplace Museum (Tupelo), **The Walter Anderson Museum** (Ocean Springs), Eudora Welty House & Garden (Jackson) and the The Ohr-O'Keefe Museum of Art (Biloxi).
- If you want fine craftsmanship, Mississippi has plenty to offer at the **Craftsmen's Guild of Mississippi** Chimneyville Arts Festival (Ridgeland) or the annual Mississippi Makers Fest at the Two Mississippi Museums (Jackson). An artist installation honoring Civil Rights Movement activists that emits light, music, and words is part of the Museum, which is

- a powerful interpreter of the past of the state.
- Festivals in Mississippi showcase both celebrated and emerging artists. The Mississippi Book Festival (Jackson) and Tennessee Williams Tribute (Columbus) both place a strong emphasis on writers. Musicians flourish at the Music by Women Festival (Columbus), FestivalSouth (Hattiesburg), and America's longestrunning music festival, the Jimmie Rogers Festival (Meridian). The Choctaw Indian Fair (Philadelphia) and Mississippi Cultural Crossroads (Port Gibson) both celebrate traditional cultures. Other can't-miss arts-based festivals include **Peter Anderson Arts** & Crafts Festival (Ocean Springs) as well as **Double Decker** (Oxford) and the Cotton District Arts Festival (Starkville).
