The national arts and culture sector was a **\$1.102 trillion industry** in **2022** (**4.31%** of the nation's GDP), representing **5.2 million jobs** (**3.28%** of nation's workforce), and total compensation of **\$540.9 billion**.

FEDERAL FUNDING FOR THE NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE ARTS

Federal Appropriation FY24 \$207 Million

Congress allocated **\$207 million** to the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) in **FY24**. This amounts to just **62 cents per capita**. Ideally, Congress should index \$1 per capita funding to the NEA.

THE ARTS ARE EVERYWHERE

- To fully experience the **Northeast Kingdom** start with Dog Mountain, home of the Stephen Huneck Gallery and 150 acres of dog-friendly grounds. Or, head to Bread and Puppet, one of the nation's oldest political theater companies and a 140-year old hay barn that has been transformed into a museum with an exquisite collection.
- **Burlington**, Vermont's "Queen City," is both the largest city in the state and a hub of arts activities and is home to The Flynn, the city's flagship performing arts center for 90 years. On the Church Street pedestrian mall, visit Burlington City Arts and Frog Hollow, home to more than 200

Vermont artists and artisans. Or venture to the South End Arts District for a meandering collection of galleries and artist studios—and the site of the South End Art Hop each September.

- In Middlebury, the college campus offers the Museum of Art and Mahaney Center for the Arts. Town Hall Theater offers theater, opera, films, and a gallery. It is also host to the August Middlebury New Filmmakers Festival.
- Downtown **Rutland** is home to several incredible works of art from local, national, and international artists and home to The Paramount Theatre for world class live entertainment. Take a walk on the sculpture trail to

view historic works featuring moments from Vermont's storied marble history. Discover 20 largerthan-life murals adorning the town's historic buildings and visit unique exhibitions at five local galleries.

- In Brattleboro, see a world-class jazz ensemble at the Vermont Jazz Center or a performance at the New England Center for Circus Arts. The Brattleboro Museum & Art Center offers contemporary art exhibits throughout the year, while Epsilon Spires offers provocative performances and interactive art installations.
- A first stop in the **Bennington** area is The Bennington Museum, featuring the largest collection of paintings by American folk artist Grandma Moses.
